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California Gasoline: Prices Up, Consumption Down Prices Reach \$4.29 a Gallon in April, Gasoline Use Drops 1.7%

Sacramento –California’s average gasoline price reached \$4.29 in April as gasoline consumption in California declined 1.7 percent, according to a report released today by Betty T. Yee, First District Member of the California State Board of Equalization (BOE). (*See chart for year-over-year monthly gasoline consumption comparisons.*)

“Sustained months of high gas prices have hit family budgets hard and appear to be leading to long-term changes in consumption habits we’re seeing reflected in fuel tax information,” said Yee.

In California, average gasoline prices were up 9 cents to \$4.29 in April. Total [gasoline consumption](#) for April was 1.18 billion gallons compared to April of last year, when it was 1.20 billion gallons, which is a 1.7 percent decline. California diesel consumption declined 6.1 percent in April.

Nationally, regular gasoline averaged \$3.96 a gallon, up 11 cents from April of last year according to the U.S. [Energy Information Administration](#) (EIA). The EIA diesel retail prices reported the national average price of diesel was up 5 cents to \$4.12 in April from a year earlier.

High gasoline prices might be causing a shift in driving and auto ownership patterns. Declines in both cars per licensed driver and licensed drivers per driving-age population were cited in a February report, [North America – U.S. Economics – Motor Vehicles](#), *State of the U.S. Motor Vehicle Industry: 2012*, by Briefing Research, a group based in Chicago and Burlingame. According to the report, “For the past several years, the recession and the economic uncertainty in the immediate aftermath caused motor vehicle sales to fall to their lowest point since data became available in 1976.”

The upcoming BOE [Economic Perspective](#) newsletter (August 2012) reports that spending on gasoline increased greatly for all households, a minimum of \$378 for the lowest-earning, and up to a maximum of \$1,187 for the top-earning households during the 10-year period of 2000 through 2010. These increases are not surprising with an 86 percent increase in gas prices during the same period.

The *Economic Perspective* also reports that households are buying cars less frequently today than they were a decade ago, as spending on new and used cars declined for all households from 2000 to 2010.

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
The average age of cars owned by households rose from 8.9 years in 2000 to 10.6 years in 2010. The average age of cars has been rising since the mid-1990s.

BOE monitors gasoline consumption using tax receipts paid by fuel distributors in California. BOE updates the fuel reports at the end of each month.


