Action: Upon motion of Mr. Runner, seconded by Ms. Harkey and unanimously carried, Ms. Harkey, Mr. Runner, Ms. Ma, Mr. Horton and Ms. Stowers voting yes, the Board directed staff to provide at its July meeting an updated analysis of BOE's projected revenue and projected noncompliance relative to legalized recreational cannabis.

Ms. Harkey directed staff to provide the Board Members with staff's Department of Finance, Office of State Audits & Evaluations, Corrective Action Plan (aka, OSAE CAP-DOF) for their information.

Property Tax Deputy Director's Report

Jose Gonzalez, Compensation Lead, CROS Project Team, Business Management Division, presented an overview of the CROS compensation model (Exhibit 5.8)

The Board recessed at 12:18 p.m. and reconvened at 1:36 p.m. with Ms. Harkey, Ms. Ma, Mr. Horton and Ms. Yee present.

The Board recessed at 1:50 p.m. and reconvened immediately in open session with Ms. Harkey, Mr. Runner, Ms. Ma, Mr. Horton and Ms. Yee present.

The Board recessed at 1:51 p.m. and reconvened at 2:35 p.m. with Ms. Harkey, Mr. Runner, Ms. Ma, Mr. Horton and Ms. Yee present.

BOARD MEMBER REQUESTED MATTERS

Action: Mr. Runner moved to take up Ms. Yee's item, Organization of the Board, before the other two Board Member requested matters on the agenda. The motion was seconded by Ms. Ma but no vote was taken.

Board Members discussed the following matters concurrently: *Solutions to Issues Raised by Oversight Hearings and Department of Finance Evaluation* (Ms. Harkey) (Exhibit 5.9); and, *Organization of the Board* (Ms. Yee) (Exhibit 5.10).

Ms. Yee made introductory remarks to identify the range of issues to be incorporated into a single document, Board governance policy.

Included in this discussion were the following topics: agency review; staffing models; facilities master plan; comprehensive agency mail, education and outreach budget; Board Member appointments of Executive Team staff; Chief Counsel direct report; investigation authority in Government Code section 15623; ex-parte communication disclosure; Board of Equalization Administrative Manual (BEAM) review; use of Provision 1 staff (revenue generating positions); policies for staff "loaned" to Members and/or interagency loans; hiring freeze and civil service hiring practices; roles of Chair and Vice Chair; and, committees.

Action: Ms. Yee made a motion that Board Members have no reach into rank-and-file staff or to managers and supervises who are in the middle of a pending auditor compliance issue. Ms. Harkey offered an amendment to adopt the May 16, 2016 memo by Former BOE Chief Counsel Randy Ferris as a guideline and direct staff to come back with further clarification, for the Board's review, as to how Board Members might communicate in response to constituent inquiries once a petition has been filed. The motion failed for lack of a second.

Ms. Harkey moved to keep Government Code section 15623 and to clarify its implementation with the May 16, 2016 memo by Former BOE Chief Counsel Randy Ferris, and clarify that investigative duties of Members do not cease because a constituent matter has been petitioned, and that Members should be permitted to ask agency staff at an appropriate level to respond to inquiries anywhere in the process except with respect to settlement. The motion failed for lack of a second.

Upon motion of Ms. Yee, seconded by Mr. Runner and unanimously carried, Ms. Harkey, Mr. Runner, Ms. Ma, Mr. Horton and Ms. Yee voting yes, to the extent that Government Code section 15623 remains law, the Board adopted the May 16, 2016 memo by Former BOE Chief Counsel Randy Ferris to clarify the implementation of that code section; and, directed staff to come back with recommendations on how to handle matters that are presented to Board Members that are in the petitions process.

Ms. Harkey directed staff to come back with an outline or guideline to implement discipline of a Member if the Member fails to meet the Board standards.

The Board directed staff to further develop a governance policy document.

Action: Ms. Harkey moved to add the following language to the draft governance policy under X. H. Participation in Operations, Staff Meetings and Activities, "unless a request is made by a Board Member and approved by the Executive Director." The motion was seconded by Mr. Runner but no vote was taken.

The Board recessed at 5:05 p.m. and reconvened at 5:11 p.m. with Ms. Harkey, Mr. Runner, Ms. Ma, Mr. Horton and Ms. Yee present.
